Learn and Serve Grant #1. The POLS 100 American National Government service learning project focussed on the issue of poverty and homelessness in America. In light of the current recession, POLS 100 American National Government students will have an opportunity to visit the Hunger Outreach Ministry at Mt. Olivet Baptist Church, Columbus, OH. Students had an opportunity to participate in the following service activities: (1) students observed the interactions and attitudes of homeless/marginalized persons, (2) observed the interactions and attitude of those who volunteer to serve the homeless/marginalized persons, (3) observed the interactions between the servers and homeless persons, (4) served and fellowship with homeless and marginalized people in one of several capacities (i.e. work with kitchen crew, participate as a server, assist with the clothing closet, assist with set up and cleaning). Each student was required to visit the Hunger Outreach for a total of 20 -25 hours during the Winter quarter to fulfill the service learning component of the course. The project and service learning activities afforded students the chance to (1) observe first-hand the impact the economic downturn has had on the number of people served in soup kitchens, food pantries and clothing closets, (2) interact with marginalized people and learn about how they came to need help from the Hunger Outreach Ministry, (3) develop a team/group assignment that will allow them to give back to persons in need through a clothing drive, food drive, etc., (4) assess and evaluate the successes and failures of the American government as it relates to its ability to provide for the basic needs of homeless and marginalized individuals.

Learn and Serve Grant #2. The POLS 215 American Legislative Process Service Learning Project provided an opportunity for students to learn about human trafficking/modern day slavery or commercial sex exploitation. The purpose of the service learning project was to introduce students

Ohio law(s) and anti-human trafficking legislation in the United States, especially Ohio. Modern day slavery/Human Trafficking and or commercial sex exploitation is a criminal activity in which people are recruited, transported, bought, or kidnapped and forced or coerced to serve an exploitative purpose, such as commercial sex and panhandling. Human trafficking is a growing issue in Ohio, particularly in Toledo, Dayton, Cincinnati and Columbus. Therefore, the purpose of the project was to educate and raise awareness about human trafficking and commercial sex exploitation among Otterbein students, the Otterbein community, and the cities of Westerville and Columbus. Service Learning activities included (1) developing materials (brochures, public service announcements and presentation boards) for dissemination on campus,

and throughout the cities of Westerville and Columbus (2) assisting Theresa Flores and Gracehaven House with door to door canvassing, working with a telephone bank, letter writing/petition campaigns urging the Ohio legislature to pass legislation that will protect victims, and planning for the "Walk a Mile in Her Shoes" event held annually and (3) organizing a fundraiser for Gracehaven House during the ninth week of the winter quarter 2010 (all proceeds will be presented on behalf of the POLS 215 students and Otterbein). Students hosted "A Night For Freedom" in the Camous Center on Wednesday, March 3, 2010. There were approximately 200 people in attendance. The event keynote speaker was Theresa Flores, a commercial sex exploitation survivor and anti-human trafficking advocate.

Sabbatical Abstracts

JAMES A. BATES

Assistant Professor of Music

This research project used primary source material from historical treatises to study and compare the improvisational practices of the viola da gamba in Italy and England. The findings will result in a better understanding of the instrumental practices of the late Renaissance and be of use to performers today. Winter 2010

SARAH S. BOUCHARD

Assistant Professor of Life and Earth Sciences

I spent five weeks at the Smithsonian Tropical Research Station in Gamboa, Panama where I conducted two independent research projects. The first built upon my ongoing research into developmental diet switches in freshwater slider turtles. These turtles typically begin life as carnivores and then switch to herbivory as they grow. While in Panama, I encountered a rainforest pond, inhabited by tropical sliders, but devoid of aquatic vegetation. I assessed turtle diets in this pond through fecal analysis to determine how adult turtles subsisted in the absence of this important food source. The second research project I conducted was in conjunction with collaborators at Boston University and Virginia Commonwealth University on the red-eyed treefrog. Before I arrived in Panama, my collaborators discovered that small juvenile treefrogs emerging from a pond after metamorphosis grow at a faster rate than larger juveniles. I conducted a series of feeding trials in which I investigated the physiological mechanisms underlying this pattern. Both the turtle and frog projects have led to exciting new lines of research in my lab. Autumn 2009

SHARON L. CARLSON

Professor of Nursing

This project focused on three areas including: 1) development of US-Swedish cross-cultural research on health promotion for elderly persons 75 to 84 years of age; 2) expansion of an on-line English course for nursing students at the University of Kalmar, Sweden; and 3) promotion of continued student/faculty exchanges between Otterbein College and the University of Kalmar, Sweden. Autumn 2009

SUSAN D. CONSTABLE

Associate Professor of Education

The purpose of my sabbatical project was to examine multiple aspects of the Otterbein Master of Arts in Education (MAE) program and a similar program at the Comparison Institute (CI) to gather information and determine program effectiveness and

relevance given recent policy changes, current school climates, and the economic and emotional states of the nation. Findings include: 1) Different students desire different features in a graduate program: Some are looking for "fast and easy" while others are looking for "focused and rigorous." This is the case across institutions. 2) Otterbein Students most frequently reported choosing Otterbein for graduate school because of: a. convenience, b. program reputation, and c. specific program offerings; c) In their graduate school experiences at Otterbein, teachers most liked: a. learning new teaching ideas; b. having opportunities for professional, collegial discussions, c. the convenience of class schedules and geographic location, and d. the intellectual challenge; 4) The graduate program at Otterbein most significantly impacted practicing teachers' a. Roles as action researchers in their classrooms, b. Beliefs about how students learn, c. Beliefs about what is effective teaching, and d. Research skills. Autumn 2009

ALLAN D. COOPER

Professor of History and Political Science

Patriarchal governance systems have utilized "beauty" as a political ideology that has resulted in the domestication and subordination of women. This project utilizes the archives of the Hagley Library in Wilmington, DE to explore how American corporate leaders fashioned "beauty" with various products aimed at women from 1860-1960. Autumn 2009

MARJORIE J. CORNELL

Professor of Foreign Language

I honed my storytelling skills in Spanish under the mentorship of Ana Victoria Garro Leit n, a Costa Rican storyteller. Participation in the workshop has prepared me to use Latin American storytelling as a teaching tool in my classes and also to perform as a bilingual storyteller within the Central Ohio community. Winter 2010

DENNIS F. DAVENPORT

Associate Professor of Music

I will compose music for a set of one-act operas based on "First Encounters" by Nancy Caldwell Sorel and Edward Sorel, with libretti by Sarah Davenport (my spouse). I will complete the first opera in the set, "Isak Dinesen Meets Marilyn Monroe," and I will begin work on the second opera, "Berthe Morisot Meets Edouard Manet." The operas will be presented at Otterbein in some form. Spring 2010

KIM E. FISCHER***Associate Professor of Health and Sport Sciences***

My sabbatical was spent implementing the OtterFit Faculty and Staff Health and Fitness Program and writing a document for publication about this program. The OtterFit program has been offered to faculty and staff for the past five fall quarters in connection with a student assignment in the Fitness Leadership class that I teach each fall. This is the first quarter that this program has been offered outside of a class assignment. Students benefit from the practical experience and faculty and staff have requested that this free program of health and fitness be continued into the winter and spring quarters. Students majoring in Health Promotion and Fitness serve as student trainers and group exercise leaders for those faculty and staff volunteers to the OtterFit program. These students are registering and fulfilling the requirements for an independent study or internship in the Health Promotion and Fitness major. Winter 2010

WILLIAM V. HARPER***Professor of Mathematical Sciences***

This research develops an Empirical Distribution Function Goodness of Fit Test to assess if a proposed Weibull distribution adequately matches the observed data. The related Excel VBA software will be free on the web. Applications include off-shore oil spill data from the Gulf of Mexico collected by the author. Autumn 2009

DENISE Y. HATTER-FISHER***Professor of Psychology***

The sabbatical involved professional development in the areas of health psychology and qualitative analysis. Also, scholarly concentrated on the development and presentation of an empirically based work titled: Depression, Racism, Alexithymia, and Blood Pressure in Blacks. The scholarly work was presented in San Diego California at the annual meeting of the Association of Psychophysiology and Biofeedback (AAPB). Winter 2010

TERRENCE A. HERMSEN***Assistant Professor of English***

I proposed and accomplished three inter-related goals: increased my facility in Spanish to begin translating South American poets; conducted research into the poetry of Pablo Neruda, to produce a scholarly essay on his work; and conducted a poetry residency at a bilingual school in Chile, along with other ventures during that visit. Autumn 2009

NICHOLAS A. HILL***Professor of Art***

I traveled to Santiago, Chile and curated an exhibition of contemporary Chilean prints that will be exhibited at the Otterbein and two other Ohio venues in 2010-2011. I was invited to be a guest artist at

Taller 99, a print studio in Santiago. I completed new series of drawings and prints to be exhibited in a solo exhibition at Otterbein in fall 2010. These projects received grants from the Ohio Arts Foundation and the Ohio Arts Council. I was granted a two-week residency at the Ragdale Foundation in Illinois. Winter 2010

IOAN HRINCA***Professor of Mathematical Sciences***

Past sabbatical projects have focused on the exploration of the Erlanger Programm of Felix Klein, a uniform approach to the study of modern geometries. Topics included Euclidean, Hyperbolic and Elliptic Geometry; Absolute Geometry, Projective Geometry, Solid Geometry and Discrete Geometry. I read several books, solved interesting problems and gave talks on modern geometries. During this last sabbatical leave I wrote lectures notes for a course in geometry based on my research and experience, course that I intend to teach it here in the near future. Winter 2010

MARSHA M. HUBER***Professor of Business, Accounting and Economics***

The purpose of my sabbatical was to pursue scholarly endeavors by writing journal articles, a book proposal, and presenting at conferences. I submitted two papers to conferences, one (with a co-author) on the "Effects of the Computerized Classroom" and another on "The Student's Rage: What we can Learn from Comments on Ratemyprofessor.com." I also submitted and presented at the Lilly Conference and the ISSOTL Conference. DEANNE E. KNOBLAUCH***Assistant Professor of Education***

In this study, student teacher efficacy beliefs (confidence in teaching ability) and attributions were examined with the focus on context, primarily the school setting (i.e., rural, suburban, and urban) to determine if setting had an influence on the development of the student teachers' efficacy beliefs and the attributions they make afterwards. MARGARET M. KOEHLER***Associate Professor of English***

I devoted my sabbatical to a combination of two projects: the revision of my current book manuscript, "Attention Dividends in Eighteenth-Century Poetry," and the commencement of my new project on the neglected eighteenth-century writer John Aikin. Autumn 2009

ROBERT N. KRAFT***Professor of Psychology***

The sabbatical involved five sets of activities: 1) investigating violent ideologies by studying pro-apartheid and anti-apartheid materials in the Bodleian Library of Commonwealth and African Studies at Rhodes House, 2) presenting a paper at the University of Chester comparing victim testimonies and perpetrator testimonies, 3) further reading and study of materials on apartheid, including post-apartheid commentary on truth and reconciliation, 4) researching the history and practice of truth commissions, and 5) writing. Autumn 2009

SHANNON K. LAKANEN***Associate Professor of English***

With the support of a Fulbright fellowship, I taught writing to seniors and post-graduate students at the University of Montenegro. I also lead creative writing workshops at the American Corners in Podgorica and Pljevlja, Montenegro, and traveled throughout Eastern Europe and Turkey during breaks from classes. Autumn 2009

EDA L. MIKOLAJ***Professor of Nursing***

I am examining the conflicts that undergraduate adult women students perceive in their life situations as they meet adult responsibilities as parent, mate, home manager and/or worker while pursuing a college degree. Based on the research results, additional support services for adult college students may be recommended for consideration. Winter 2010

CHRISTINA L. REYNOLDS***Professor of Communication***

I will develop a prospectus and detailed outline for a textbook and supplemental materials suitable for use in an "Advanced Public Speaking" course taught at the College/University level. The prospectus will be submitted to three publishing houses for review and evaluation. Autumn 2009

DAVID G. ROBERTSON***Associate Professor and Chair of Physics and Astronomy***

I propose to continue work on developing tools for precision calculations in quantum field theory. Such tools are needed for the analysis of data from upcoming experiments designed to search for "supersymmetry", a symmetry relating particles of different spins and that may be an integral part of the most fundamental theories of physics. Spring 2010

DIANE A. ROSS***Associate Professor of Education***

My sabbatical goal is to understand concepts of peace and social justice research and theory by teaching and studying at the World Peace Academy in Basel, Switzerland. I will then situate this knowledge within the NGO FOYA Uganda (Forum for Youth Advocacy Uganda) framework through a case study in Kampala, Uganda at the Naguru Parents' School. Spring 2010

PETER SANDERSON***Professor of Mathematical Sciences***

This sabbatical research project will enhance the text editing component of the MARS integrated development environment used by computer science and engineering students and professors worldwide for writing assembly language programs. The enhanced text editor will color-highlight different language elements and offer contextual guidance. Spring 2010

JEREMY H. SMITH***Professor of English***

The proposed paper will be a phenomenological study of the experience of other human beings, focusing on the meaning of empathy and the evidential value of feeling in lived experience. This paper forms part of a larger project creating a new aesthetics of literature, which defends the notion of truth in literary art. Spring 2010

GREGORY S. SULLIVAN***Assistant Professor of Health and Sport Sciences***

Although I had something entirely different planned for my sabbatical, my plans changed very dramatically at the last minute.
