ANNOUNCING SCHOLARSHIP DAY, APRIL 25 \$1900 IN AWARDS

On Saturday, April 25, Otterbein is inviting those high school seniors who rank in the highest third of their class to come to the campus to participate in a series of examinations for recognition of attainment in general scholarship. The General Examination will include English, a General Ability Test, and one other subject chosen from the following: Biology, Chemistry, French, Mathematics, Physics, Spanish and U.S. History Three full-tuition and Civics. scholarships of \$225 and three half-tuition scholarships of \$112.50 will be awarded to the winners.

In addition to the General Examinations, contests will be held in the following fields of music: Vocal, Piano, and Violin or other instrument. The contests will be in the nature of a private audition before a Committee from the Department of Music, and each contestant will be expected to prepare at least two contrasting numbers of classical or semi-classical music of their own selection. A student may enter any one or all three of the music con-

tests, but will be awarded *only one* scholarship. Three scholarships of \$200 each and three scholarships of \$100 each will be awarded to the winners.

This marks the twelfth annual Scholarship Day which the College has offered. Each year the event has grown in size and importance, and the number of contestants has increased from forty-five to one hundred and twenty-five. The scholarships not only offer unusual financial aid opportunities to deserving students, but this program also brings to our campus many outstanding prospective students.

Alumni are urged to call these scholarships to the attention of high school seniors who are eligible to compete. If you are a pastor or a teacher, bring a car load of young people to the campus for this weekend.

OTTERBEIN TO HAVE SUMMER SESSION

In an effort to do its part in the present emergency Otterbein College will, for the duration, admit freshmen in June, September, and February. This will make it possible for boys graduating from high school to complete their college courses before being called to military service. Also girls may complete their work and enter teaching or business positions while there are many openings.

During the 1942 summer school the following courses will be offered: Old Testament History, Life of Jesus, Hebrew Prophets, Zoology, Bacteriology, Physiology, General Chemistry, Organic Chemistry, Quantitative Analysis, Principles of Economics, Advanced Accounting, Freshman Composition, English Literature, Contemporary English and American Literature, Second vear French, European history, American Government, Introduction to Study of Society, Race and Population Problems, First and Second year Spanish, Practical Speech and Play Production.

Courses in other departments will be organized if there is sufficient demand. Proper sequences will be available in the following semesters so that a student may complete his course in three years from the time of his entrance. In addition to the above, special defense courses will be offered as the need and demand determine.

May we suggest to alumni who are in the teaching field that here is your opportunity to return to the alma mater for a happy summer school experience. By taking several of the courses offered, you could probably qualify yourself to teach in an additional field, and at the same time relive old memories on the campus we all love.
