Educational Mathematics Ted Lasso's BELIEVE versus Reality

Fans of television's *Ted Lasso* will understand the power of BELIEVE. Unfortunately, mathematics paints a very different picture when predicting who will win soccer matches for under-sourced teams. According to PHYS.ORG, in a recent article from *Royal Society Open Science*, Oxford researchers Victor Martins Maimone and Taha Yasseri report on their findings from an analysis of 88,000 professional football (soccer) matches. The data were collected spanning the years 1993-2019 and included records from teams across the globe, including Scotland, Greece, Turkey, Spain, Belgium, and England's Premier League. *Continue reading* >>
