## Bloodmobile rolls on to campus

On Tuesday, November 9, Otterbein will once again be participating in the Red Cross Bloodmobile. Otterbein conducted two such bloodmobiles last year, collecting a total of 171 pints of blood.

be sure when the unexpected such as an automobile accident will create a demand for large quantities of one type of blood. Some needs are predictable, however, as in the case of open heart surgery, which requires an average of 20 pints of blood. Eleven such surgeries are scheduled for the week of the Otterbein bloodmobile, and while the agency needs any type of blood, these operations will put types B+, O+, and O- on the critical need list.

According to Mr. Dennis Dittiatur, of the American Red Cross, a donation of this size meant that proportionally, Otterbein outdonated Ohio State by more than 100%.

Otterbein's bloodmobile will take place from 10-4. Anyone who is willing to help by donating may make an appointment through the Campus Center office.

Population growth, surgical and medical advances, expanded hospital facilities, and open heart surgeries have brought the need for blood by the Red Cross' 50 participating hospitals to about 2,000 pints of blood per week.

# Otterbein Health Center deals with problem

Veneral disease and unwanted pregnancies are realities in our society. These realities are also apparent to the Otterbein community. The Grant-Otterbein Urgent Care Center offers contraceptive services to Otterbein students.

Otterbein women no longer have to go to downtown Columbus for medical attention. The Care Center staff takes a personal interest in you. They are able to monitor their

patients, in case any problem should arise. This is comforting to know if you are concerned about your birth control pill prescription.

An appointment can be made with the care center for a paps smear test, fitting for a diaphragm, a pelvic examination or any other related medical services. The center will dispense birth control pills after the patient has had the proper examination. Any of the nurses at the care center will be available to discuss any of these procedures

with you.

It is of no concern whether you approve or disapprove of sexual intercourse outside of marriage; all circumstances of sexual involvement are acts that will call for the accepting of responsibility for any consequences.

There is a need to offer contraceptive services to the responsible person.

The increased use of the pill has heightened the cases of veneral disease. Be careful don't take chances. Have an annual veneral disease examination. The Grant-Otterbein Urgent

Care Center will give examinations for veneral disease.

The staff of the care center are here to help you. The service is for you to use. Accept your responsibilities — trust them. They want the chance to help you in any way that they can.

### On the duties of Civil Submission

As I write this article, it's not clear yet who will be the next president of the United States. For sure, though, one group or the other will be upset about the results, and it is just as certain that whoever has won by the time this is printed has had his reputation smeared by the opposing party, and perhaps it will be hard for some to support the president, whoever he may turn out to be.

God has told Christians, though, that it is His will for us to submit to governmental authority. "Let every person be in subjection to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those which exist are established by God" (Rom. 13:1);

"Submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every human institution, whether to a king as the one in authority, or to governors as sent by him for the punishment of evildoers and the praise of those who do right. For such is the will of God that by doing right you may silence the ignorance

of foolish men" (1 Peter 2:13-15).

And no matter how we stood before the election, let us as Christians pray for who is and who will be in office. Indeed, let us give thanks for whomever God has placed above us, for in this way the gospel has a better chance of going out into the world.

The connection is made in 1 Timothy 2:1-4:

"I urge that entreaties and prayers, petitions and thanksgivings be made on behalf of all men, for kings and all who are in authority, in order that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all goalines and dignity. This is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth."

Does all this mean that the government will always be right and we should always obey? No. While submission *usually* requires obedience, it does not demand that we obey immoral laws.

For example:

King Nebuchadnezzar commanded three Jews to bow down and worship his

gods and his golden image or be thrown into a blast furnace (Daniel 3:13 ff.). They answered, "We do not need to give you an answer concerning this. If it be so, our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the furnace of blazing fire; and He will deliver us out of your hand, O king. But even if He does not, let it be known to you, O king, that we are not going to serve your gods or worship the golden image". So they were thrown into the fire.

The preincarnate Christ joined them in the furnace and protected them from the fire. And what was the result?

'Nebuchadnezzar responded and said, 'Blessed be the God of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abed-nego [the three Jews], who has sent His angel and delivered His servants who put their trust in Him, violating the king's command, and yielded up their bodies so as not to serve or worship any god except their own God.'

"Then the king caused Shadrach, Meshach, and Abed-nego to prosper in the province of Babylon" (Dan. 3:28, 30).

The men did not obey the king, but they certainly submitted to him, and God was glorified because of it, and He honored the men for it. The point is that God's blessings and power are revealed in submission.

## Comical drama is workshop

"The Lesson" by Eugene Ionesco will be presented Wednesday, November 10 at 4 p.m. and again November 12 at 7:30 p.m. in Barlow Hall. It is the third Workshop Theatre production to be done this term at Otterbein and has been described as a comical drama that explores the difficulty of communication between two individuals in a society based on language.

The characters of the Lesson exist in their own reality created by Ionesco the author of the play.

The cast of the play is composed of the professor

played by Joe Hobson, the pupil played by Barb Bolts and the maid played by Sharon Blair. Barb and Sharon are freshmen theatre majors at Otterbein and Joe is a sophomore.

According to the director, Randy Cole, it will probably be the only chance that the Otterbein community will have a chance to see a play of this type. It takes a seemingly safe relationship between a professor and a pupil and gives it an absurdist twist to drive home the point.

If your reality has become dull see "The Lesson" and it won't seem dull anymore.

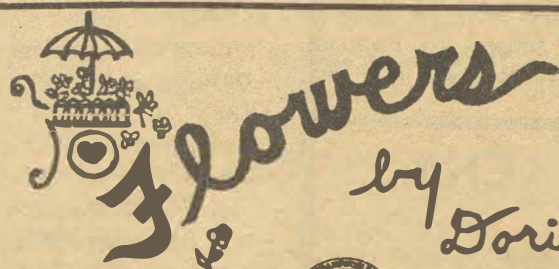

## Harriers establish school mark, Finish second in Conference meet

The Otterbein cross-country team continued their remarkable campaign by notching second place at the Ohio Athletic Conference Meet last Saturday. The team established a new school record by scoring 79 points, second only to Mount Union's 39 points.

Once again senior Tom Bachtel paced the Otters with a time of 25:08. This enabled him to capture fourth place, only fifteen seconds behind the eventual winner, Larry Coy of Baldwin-Wallace. Bachtel's time was also his second fastest ever, ranking just behind his school record set earlier this year.

Otter junior Pat Byrnes took twelfth place (26:01), while junior Royce Underwood was close behind in fourteenth place (26:03). Rounding out the Cardinals' top five finishers were freshman Rick Miller, who finished 16th (26:06), and junior Ed Stockwell, who took 33rd (26:50).

Coach Dave Lehman commented favorably on the meet: "I figured we would be in the top five, with an outside chance for second. I didn't think that we would come so close to winning, though. My main concern was for us to finish in third place in order to qualify for the NCAA meet. The key to our success was

probably the strong race run by freshman Rick Miller. Pat Byrnes also turned-in one of his best races, finishing with our second best time".

The Cardinals last meet will be the NCAA Division III meet to be held on November 13 at Case Western Reserve. Coach Lehman felt that it would be difficult to establish favorites, due to his luck of exposure to some of the other good teams in the country.

A great deal of the success of Otterbein's nearly completed season

can be directly attributed to Tom Bachtel's consistently outstanding performances. Lehman had this to say about his mainstay: "Tom had an excellent season for us. 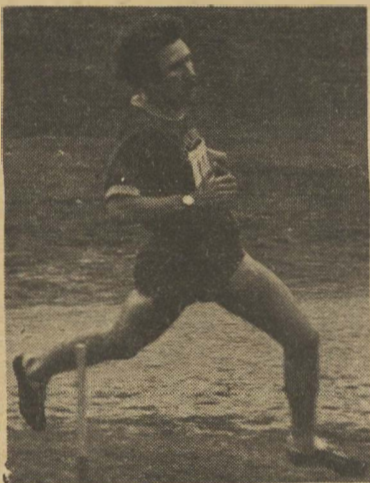
Individually two Otters appear in three of the weekly rankings. Fullback Mike Echols is third in rushing with 611 yards, and QB Bill Hillier rates third in

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# Cards outslug Wesleyan 7-6

What was supposed to be a highly offensive contest through the air turned out to be just the opposite last Saturday night as Otterbein slugged out a 7-6 win over Ohio Wesleyan.

With the number one and three conference total offensive leaders in the game, Bob Mauck and Bill Hillier respectively, most thought that the two quarterbacks would show why they were around the top of the league. Pouring rain and cold weather held both passing attacks down.

Otterbein got on the scoreboard with 1:20 to go in the half as Sophomore fullback Mike Echols capped a 76-yard drive with a one-yard run and Mike Koob's extra point attempt was good for what later proved to be the winning margin.

All of the third quarter and half of the fourth was

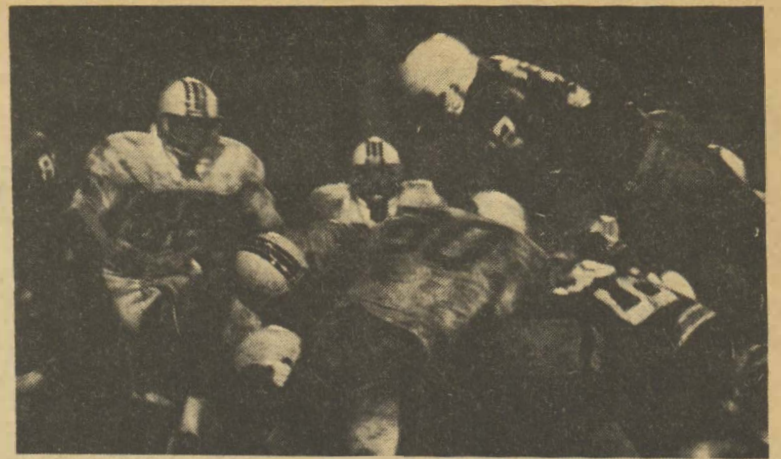
played between the 30 yard lines as each team took turns punting. But OWU quarterback Mauck got his team rolling as he completed 9 of 17 pass attempts in the second half and he carried the ball the last two yards for the TD and the Bishops only score.

The extra point attempt was off to the left and the Cards received the kickoff with 8:16 to go in the game. Hillier and company tried to run down the clock with rushing plays but Freshman Wayne Cummerlander fumbled on the Bishops 22 yard line.

Mauck then took over and was expertly quiding his team down field when Freshman defensive halfback Bob Spahr intercepted a Bob Mauck pass on the Otters 40-yard line and only :53 seconds on the clock.

Statistics for the game showed that Cummerlander

picked up 81 yards rushing and his counterpart, Echols picked 73 yards. Hillier passed for 55 yards through the air completing four of eight. The Otterbein defense limited the OWU offense to 207 total yards in the game. The Cards record is now 4-2-1 overall and 2-1-0 in the OAC Blue Division, one game behind Baldwin-Wallace.

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# Foundation announces scholarship

The Harry S. Truman Scholarship Foundation will announce its first scholarships in the Spring of 1977. Otterbein College may nominate one candidate for the program. Each scholarship will cover tuition, fees, books and room and board up to a maximum of \$5,000 per year. The awards are renewable for up to three additional years.

These awards will be for use in the 1977-1978 academic year and will be made on the basis of merit to students who will be college juniors in September

1977. To be considered for nomination as a Truman scholar, a student must complete the following requirements:

1. He must be enrolled as a matriculated student pursuing a degree at an accredited institution of higher education.
2. He must be a junior pursuing a bachelor's degree as a full-time student during the year for which nominated.
3. He must have a college grade point average of at least "B" or equivalent and be in

the upper quarter of his or her class.

4. He must be a United States citizen.
5. He must have selected an undergraduate field of study that will permit admissions to a graduate program leading to a career in public service.

Nominees for Truman scholarships must include in their application materials an essay of 500 words or less indicating his interest in pursuing a career in public service and indicating how the student's educational plans will provide preparation for that career.

The Foundation defines public service as participation in government with emphasis on administration and management.

The purpose of the foundation is to recognize President Truman's high regard for the public trust, his lively exercise of political talents, his broad knowledge of the American System, and his devotion to opportunities for the education of young people.
