## Lame, Halt Hinder Otter and Cap Hopes

CAPITAL'S DALE ROSE and Otterbein's George Novotny are working their football squads this week with one eye on the field and one eye hopefully peeled on the sidelines where the lame and halt are stationed in discouraging numbers.

The Lutherans are getting ready to travel to Marietta Friday night, while the Otters have a date with Ohio Wesleyan at Delaware Saturday.

NOVOTNY probably has the toughest assignment, especially since his squad was so badly shaken up against powerful West Virginia last week that the coach fears they won't completely recover for weeks. The Otters lost, 59-0, if you don't remember.

Gene Clark, end, and Frank Petti, tackle, two Columbus boys who were injured in the Morehead fracas, recovered sufficiently to see limited action against the West Virginians, but both aggravated their injuries. Bill Hart, guard, another Columbus player, who had several ribs broken in the opener, did not make the trip to Morgantown and will be sidelined several more weeks.

Added to this list of casualties are Ralph Pickelsimer, Otter's 250-pound center, who injured his leg during the first quarter last Saturday and spent the rest of the game on the bench; Dick Pflieger, Novotny's No. 1 ball carrier, who came out of the West Virginia game with a broken nose; Bob Agler, Pflieger's running mate from Mifflin, who is so badly bruised and shaken that it is doubtful whether he will start

against the Bishops, and Ray Chadwell, freshman end, who re-injured his leg which had been hurt in an early practice session.

Even with his squad at full strength, Novotny figures the game with Wesleyan would be a toss-up, so the Cardinals aren't looking to Saturday with much optimism. But they are glad to be back in their own class, anyway.

CAPITAL is so hard-put for halfbacks that Coach Rose has switched End Dan Susil to right half. This isn't as radical as it sounds, because Susil operated as a fullback last year and does the team's punting.

Norman Divine, who missed the Muskingum game Saturday, is still nursing a twisted ankle and Snuffy Prichard, who started at right half, is now out, also with an ailing ankle. Probably neither will see much, if any action Friday night.

Ray Martin, Gibsonburg freshman, has also been shifted from guard to left halfback to give regular Gene Shade some support and Columbuson Clarence Baker went from guard to center to back up Roy Hoch. Putt Friedley is still sidelined with a broken finger.

One break, however, is that Fullback Fred Klopfer, inactive last week because of an ankle sprain, will be available Friday. Another is that Sam Barrett, who takes over Susil's right end spot, did such a brilliant job against Muskingum that there's little worry over that flank.

The Lutherans will be going all-out Friday night to avenge a 12-0 defeat suffered at the hands of the Pioneers last year.
