Upsets Featured Saturday's Ohio College Grid Card

There were thrills and spills galore on Ohio's collegiate football scene Saturday.

Some of the most closely-waged struggles of the year marked a 24-game program with upsets on all fronts highlighting the activity.

Probably the biggest stunner of the day came at Bowling Green where Miami, beaten four times this season, nipped the Falcons, 7-6. Strong Wittenberg also bowed for the first time, losing to Lenoir Rhyne, 34-14.

This left Ohio's unbeaten untied ranks with only three teams — Baldwin-Wallace, Otterbein and John Carroll.

Even little Hiram broke into the headlines, winning for the first time since 1958.

The Terriers nipped Mount Union, 21-20, to end a 21-game drought.

MURRAY WARMATH, Minnesota coach, commenting on the play of his star, Sandy Stephens, who left practice Thursday to get married then led the 23-20 victory over Michigan: "I guess I'll have to have my whole team get married now."

Baldwin-Wallace (6-0) stayed among the elite with a tough 7-0 conquest of Akron. Unbeaten Otterbein (6-0) moved out front in the 14-member Ohio Conference with a hard-earned 10-8 victory against Marietta.

The last of the untamed triumvirate, John Carroll (4-0), had a field day with a 62-0 walloping of Wayne State.

Elsewhere, Findlay's Oilers wrapped up the Mid-Ohio League championship on the strength of a 16-8 triumph over Defiance. And the "foot" played a prominent role in at least four games.

Jim McKee's 48-yard field goal with only one second left gave Ohio University a 17-16 win over Delaware in a stirring intersectional tiff. The Bobcats scored all 17 of their points in a hectic final quarter.

OTTERBEIN got a 23-yard placement from Gary Fields to make the difference against Marietta while Dean Bittner booted a 21-yard field goal with only 2:22 remaining in Central State's 16-14 victory against Lincoln.

And a fourth period three-pointer by Tim Runyon from the 15-yard stripe provided Capital with its 10-8 win over Wooster.

IT WAS A big day for individual heroes. Quarterback Bob Graham pitched four touchdown passes and scored another as Heidelberg, winning for the first time, trounced Denison, 35-7.

Larry Fisher, a third-string halfback, scored twice as Ohio Wesleyan toppled Wabash, 13-7. Soph signal-caller Michael Wood passed for two TD's and ran for two more as Kenyon beat Oberlin, 28-13. And Gordon Piremer, a soph from Detroit, scooted 51, 26 and 6 yards for markers in John Carroll's romp over Wayne State, a Detroit school.

O.G.A. Re-Elects Earl Hamilton

Earl Hamilton, a Columbus attorney, was re-elected president of the Ohio Golf Association at a meeting of the group Sunday at Columbus Country Club. It will mark his third term in that capacity.

Also re-elected were vice president Edwin Preisler of Cleveland and secretary-treasurer William Margraf of Columbus.
