

'Angel Street' Will Be Given Two Performances In Cowan

"Angel Street," the May Day play to be presented tonight and tomorrow night in Cowan Hall, was first presented under the title "Gaslight" on December 5, 1938 at the Richmond Theatre, London, England. It was later filmed starring Ingrid Bergman and Charles Boyer and ultimately resulted in Bergman's first Oscar.

The Otterbein presentation, under the direction of Professor Marion Chase, was written by Patrick Hamilton. The entire action takes place on Angel Street, located in the Pimlico

district of London in 1880. It is the story of the Manningham household.

Pretending to be kind and gentle, Mr. Manningham (Al Kepke) about 45 years of age, is torturing his wife (Joan Durr) into insanity. He accuses her of committing misdemeanors which he himself has done. Since her mother died of insanity, she is nearly convinced that this is possible. The remainder of the play is concerned with a new situation.

The play has received good acclaims wherever it has been
