Paulsen Stands Pat In Campus Lectures

Satirist Pat Paulsen doesn't go as far in-depth as salty Mort Sahl, but he's twice as funny.

Paulsen's tongue in cheek rolled all over Otterbein College Wednesday morning and Capital University Thursday evening as part of a lengthy tour of midwestern campuses.

THE KIDS at Otterbein whooped and hollered and

swallowed Paulsen alive, finding his droll, deadpan topics and delivery quite palatable and digestive.

As might be expected, the Cap crowd accepted "Professor" Paulsen with conservative restraint, although the students hardly were unresponsive or unknowing.

Paulsen's lecture included a discourse on "How to Survive the Next Ten Years" (in five years' time), and, with double and triple entendre, a new approach to "The Sexual

Revolution: is S-E-X a Four Letter Word?

The defeated "presidential" candidate of 1968 touched just about all bases in his lecture — ecology, politics, campus upheavals and other such "picky, picky" palaver.

PAULSEN HAS come a long way in a relatively brief time. As recent as the mid-60's he only too vividly recalls working 30 shows in six days at a New Jersey night club. Arithmetic proves that out to \$2 per performance, but this lovable stone face insists he didn't complain ("I knew what kind of business it would be, and I got into it, because I wanted to").

Those were days when he washed windows — not for laughs, but for survival.

After making it big with the Smothers Brothers, Paulsen bombed in his own TV series last season, but the 140-pound wonder hardly is financially undernourished. He does an occasional club date, usually in Lake Tahoe, a few guest shots on television and has other such economic windfalls as the gasoline commercials, which is worth about a hundred thousand per annum.

PAULSEN ACCOUNTS for his physical well being by reviewing his strenuous fitness program: he climbed the highest peak in Kansas ("about 12 feet tall"), he once embarked on a rowing journey ("30 miles inland") and he competed in the Boston Marathon ("I ran it in only three days' time and finished second. The winner did it two hours and 10 minutes").

Paulsen's athletic prowess first burst into prominence when he was in high school years ago ("I was our leading scorer in basketball, really, with an average of six points a game").

This is indeed a funny, funny fellow. Long may he wave.
