

CRUISING THE OHIO COLLEGE COURSE

OWU's Hornbeck Threatens Loop Marks

Now that the Ohio college football campaign has rounded the far turn and headed into the home stretch, it is not inappropriate to discuss individuals and their record or near-record breaking performances.

Three of the outstanding candidates for Ohio Conference honors are Dave Hornbeck, Ohio Wesleyan's needle-threading quarterback; George Deo, the Jersey jolter fullback at Akron, and Bill Carpenter, Wittenberg's brilliant defensive specialist. And not the least of these is Hornbeck.

The 6-2, 180-pound senior from Springfield, Ohio, needs but 89 more yards passing in three remaining games to set a new conference standard for yards gained passing. Current record of 1214 was set in 1955 by Dick Zahn of Hiram.

And he is but 251 yards short of the individual total offense record of 1298 set by Marietta's Dallas Garber in 1959. Hornbeck has hit on 58 of 102 pitches—had only 5 intercepted—for 1126 yards and 15 touchdowns; the latter figure a national high.

DEO, THE 5-11, 190 POUND battering ram of the Zippers, leads the conference rushing with 649 yards in

156 rushes. Under Akron's fullback oriented offense, Deo keys a ground attack that Coach Gordon Larson has developed into Sherman tank proportions. The Hillsdale, N.J. thumper confines his bursts between the tackles. He

was an all-New Jersey scholastic selection and an all-Army back in 1959 before going to Akron.

Carpenter, 6-2, 190, from New Philadelphia, who plays a major role in Wittenberg's defensive act known as the "Checkmates," has his sights set on a conference mark, and oddly enough in the scoring category. It's extra points.

Carpenter, who spends most of his time in the opposi-

tion backfield, needs only three placements in three remaining games to snap the career record of 66 held by Andy Deeds of Denison, who closed out his career in 1954. Carpenter also is only one field goal shy of a new loop career record. Norman Schuele of Western Reserve kicked six field goals between 1913 and 1915. In his Wittenberg career to date Carpenter has booted 64 of 75 placement attempts. His 52-yard field goal against Marietta this season tied the OC career high.

Study Cage TV Restriction

Rix N. Yard, Denison University athletic director, has been chosen to head up an NCAA committee to study the effects of unlimited televising of major college basketball games upon attendance at college games. The committee is the outgrowth of requests from several small colleges to restrict televising of intercollegiate basketball games in a manner similar to the present football policy. Other committee members are Asa Bushnell, ECAC commissioner, Charles Neinas, assistant to the director of the NCAA, and Ivy Williamson, Wisconsin athletic director.

UPPER ARLINGTON'S BOB JENCKS not only kicked the all-winning conversion for Miami's 7-6 shocker over previously unbeaten Bowling Green, but he moved into the scoring lead in the Mid-American Conference with 19 points. Ed Chlebek of Western Michigan hit on 11 of 14 passes against Marshall to gain passing leadership (27 completions in 44 attempts for 315 yards). Toledo fullback Frank Baker racked up 100 yards against Kent State to push his total to 412 yards and just about clinch the rushing title. Bowling Green leads both team offense and defense, gaining an average of 299.2 per game while giving opponents 168.4 per game.

CLEAT BLEAT—The rash of injuries which is sure to tab Coach Gene Slaughter's first experience in the college head coaching ranks as the "year of the big hurt" even reached into the athletic publicity ranks. Rich Schieber was stricken Friday and underwent an appendectomy at Mt. Carmel. The Fighting Lutherans, who lived their nickname to the hilt in the 10-8 conquest of Wooster, go to Marietta Saturday and gunning for victory to set the stage for their season finale against arch foe, Otterbein, Nov. 11 under the Otter arcs. There's real jubilation on the Hiram campus this week after the Terriers' ended a 21-game losing streak that dated back to 1953 by beating Mt. Union, 21-20. But they nearly lost it in the final 50 seconds. The Mounts scored on a 90-yard pass play and failed for the 2-point conversion on a run. Cincinnati had a pair of season firsts in their 21-9 victory over North Texas State. The first touchdown on a pass and the first game the Bearcats have hit the end zone three times for TDs. In Detroit's 41-12 conquest of Dayton quarterback Jerry Gross, national major college leader in total offense, connected on 10 passes in 16 tries for 157 yards and added 18 in rushing to boost his total to 1163 yards. Still hyped over the surprising 28-13 win over Oberlin, Kenyon's Lords have their sights set on victory at Mt. Union this week and then over Hiram in the home finale to post the first winning season since 1950. And there's joy in Tiffin where Heidelberg notched its first win of the campaign over Denison, and quite convincing too. "we finally clicked," said Coach Bob Winterburn.

Aiken, Ex-Canton Coach; Suffers Fatal Heart Attack

Jim Aiken, about 60, former University of Oregon football coach, collapsed suddenly and died after speaking at a banquet in Medford, Ore., Tuesday night.

Aiken, who had been serving as athletic director of Roseburg, Ore., high school, coached at several Ohio high schools before moving west to the University of Idaho. His last job in Ohio was at Canton McKinley. One of his star players at McKinley was Marion Motley, who starred at Nevada and then went on for an interesting career with the Cleveland Browns.

Aiken came to the University of Oregon in 1947 and the next year coached the Ducks to the Cotton Bowl.

He coached Oregon teams for four years and compiled a 21 won, 20 lost record.

He went into the lumber business in Roseburg, and later took the high school
