THE BIG PLAY in the drive was a Lukey-to-Traylor pass reception that covered 18 yards and moved the Otters to the visitors' 23.

Len Simonetti's interception of a Christen-to-Myers aerial set up a 40-yard Trevor Newland field goal that gave Otterbein a 10-7 lead with 11:30 to go in the half.

Kenyon took the ensuing kickoff 80 yards in 10 plays to go up 14-10 with 6:31 showing. Schneider ripped through right guard from 18 yards out for the six-pointer.

THE DRIVE was helped along by a defensive pass interference call against the Otters that moved it from the Cards' 49 to their 32-yard line.

Christian found Myers alone in the end zone on a pass play that covered 28 yards with 10 seconds to go in the half to send the Lords into the dressing room with a comfortable 21-10 advantage.

Tom Samstag had a 17-yard burst up the middle and caught a 10-yard pass from Christen during the 80-yard drive following an Otterbein punt. Myers deftly slipped through the Otter secondary with a couple of beautiful moves to get loose in the end zone.
