Fun Monday, Fight Saturday For Coaches Larson, Shipe

Gordon Larson and Phil Shipe sat so close to each other Monday noon they rubbed elbows. And the friendship was just as close.

Saturday they'll be 160 feet apart, battling each other like mortal enemies for 60 minutes.

Larson is head coach of the unbeaten Akron University football team. Shipe has the same job at College of Wooster, where his Scots have a 1-2-1 record. Saturday these two Ohio Conference antagonists meet in Akron's Rubber Bowl.

The chummy get-together Monday was the Downtown Kiwanis Club's fifth annual Football Is Fun program at the Neil House arranged and emceed by Paul L. Walker.

AFTER A unit from the Akron marching band and a bagpipe-drum combo from Wooster's kiltie band shook the ballroom rafters, Larson and Shipe got around to a few remarks on their game Saturday.

Said Shipe: "We know Akron is plenty tough, but we enter every game confident we can win. Our scouts tell me Wooster can match Akron only in bands and majorettes."

Said Larson: "We don't want to be lulled into complacency by these Wooster people. We are expecting and preparing for a rough game."

Humor for the program was provided by two of the veteran athletic directors, Kenneth (Red) Cochrane of Akron and E. M. (Mose) Hole of Wooster. Visiting guests also included Wooster's dean Ralph Young and Akron's team captain, End Tom Adolph, and Quarterback Joe Mackey.

WHILE AKRON and Wooster are engaged in their neighborhood fuss, the conference's headliner Saturday is at Springfield where Wittenberg and Capital both unbeaten, are matched.

Defending champion Wittenberg has bowled over Otterbein, Heidelberg and Marietta. Capital has won its three from Mt. Union, Hiram and Kenyon.

CLEAT BLEAT — George Deo, Akron's great fullback, suffered a bruised shoulder last Saturday against Heidelberg and is a doubtful starter against Wooster. . . . Hiram has two strong contenders for all-conference honors in passing artist John Ferrara and the slippery scatback, Eric Thompson. . . . Ferrara had a 14 of 24 days against Ohio Wesleyan while Thompson scored two TDs and ran 174 yards in nine carries. . . . With high octane offenses all

the rage it was a real oddity to find Muskingum and Mt. Union locked up in a punting duel. . . the Mounts had nine boots for 328 yards and the

Muskies eight for 248 yards. . . . Tom Grzywinski, Defiance's Little All-American quarterback candidate, has regained his passing artistry. . . he fired two bullseyes to give the Jackals a 14-8 win over Wilmington in the Mid-Ohio League. . . . Another quarterback in form is Stoner Tracy of Allegheny in the Presidents' Conference. Tracy had a field day in the 27-8 win over Case. . . he passed for three touchdowns and two extra points and kicked a point. . . he had 11 completions in 20 attempts for 215 yards. . . . Otterbein got a lot of work out of Fullback Bill Messmer and Halfback Harry Klockner in the 35-14 win over Oberlin. . . . Messmer piled up 147 yards in 28 carries while Klockner ripped off 133 yards in 23 attempts.
