# Cherry Green New OC Hue

Ohio Conference footballers firmly believe that records are made to be broken.

At the rate standards are being established in the sprawling Buckeye college circuit, the record book's old stencils won't be worth their wax. Ten new marks have been recorded and there's still four weeks to play.

Wittenberg's great end, Bob Cherry, set a pair of career records in the Tigers' 57-7 thrashing of Marietta. His 22 touchdown pass catches breaks the mark of 21 set by Ron Jones at Otterbein in 1957-1960. Cherry's 1435 total yards on pass receptions bettered the old record of 1298 accomplished by Larry Rosenthal at Marietta in 1956-1959.

CAPITAL'S Crusaders accounted for three new records in the 52-6 crusher over Kenyon. The 28 first downs rushing, 32 total first downs and Chuck Daubenmier's seven conversions went into the record manual.

Otterbein's Gary Reynolds continues as the conference's rushing leader with 449 yards net on 72 carries.

Terry Heaton of Marietta is the passing leader. Based on the number of completions, not percentage, Heaton paces the pack with his 58 good in 123 pitches. His bombs have accounted for 965 yards, eight TDs and 10 have been intercepted.

GREEN, who needs but 118 yards to break the conference individual offense record (1321 by Tony Hall of Denison in 1962), has been

good on 55 of 90 shots for 1180 yards, 12 touchdowns and six interceptions. Dave Kull, Otterbein's southpaw slingshot, is third with 45 of 95 for 718 yards, four touchdowns and he's lost only three by theft.

Other individual leaders are Gary Koning, Heidelberg, punting, 39.5 yards; Cherry of Wittenberg and Bill Thompson of Otterbein, scoring 48 points; and Bob Wolfarth, Marietta, pass receiving leader with 27 catches for 371 yards.

CAPITAL'S Daubenmier didn't have the only fancy foot in the conference last weekend. The Logan tosmith set his record with

seven placements, but Jim Render booted six for Wittenberg and Bob Balogh had four for Baldwin-Wallace against Hillsdale.

There'll be a football umbrella over Otterbein's Memorial Stadium Saturday in the Cardinals' homecoming fracas with Marietta. The Otters are ranked ninth in pass defense (third in pass offense) while Marietta is 10th in air defense (second in pass offense).

The conference's unbeaten leader, Denison, entertains Heidelberg while Ohio Wesleyan will stay home to feel the wrath of Wittenberg. Capital's physically battered

Crusaders have a rough afternoon ahead in Akron for the Zips' homecoming. Kenyon goes to Oberlin and Mt. Union is at Hiram.
