Dear Lois:

Enclosed is a scrapbook that "captures" life at Otterbein College from 1924-1928. It was created by student Burgess "Red" Shaffer of Somerset, Pennsylvania. Attached is a "contents" page to illustrate the breadth of the scrapbook.

The scrapbook has made a circuitous route to the Otterbein College Archives. A neighbor of Shaffer's in Johnstown (where Shaffer lived after attending Otterbein), William Spicher, was planning a yard sale and Burgess Shaffer's daughter gave him the scrapbook to sell. Neighbor Harry Dishong saw the Otterbein scrapbook and said to William Spicher that Otterbein College was where his cousin Patty Hopkins '62 went to college. William Spicher then gave the scrapbook to Harry Dishong for Patty, who lives in Jonesboro, Maine.

Patty says, "It is a very nostalgic collection, but I knew from the start that it wasn't something I should keep. I am glad it will be where it belongs."

Patty gave the scrapbook to John Lloyd '60 of London, Ohio. He then handed it on to his sister Margaret Lloyd Trent '65 to hand deliver to the Archives at the Monroe Courtright Memorial Library at Otterbein College, after sharing the contents with Dean Joanne Van Sant before releasing it to the Archives. While Dean Van was not at Otterbein in the 1920's she will recognize some of the names noted in the scrapbook such as contemporaries of Burgess Shaffer, Verda Evans and Robert Knight.

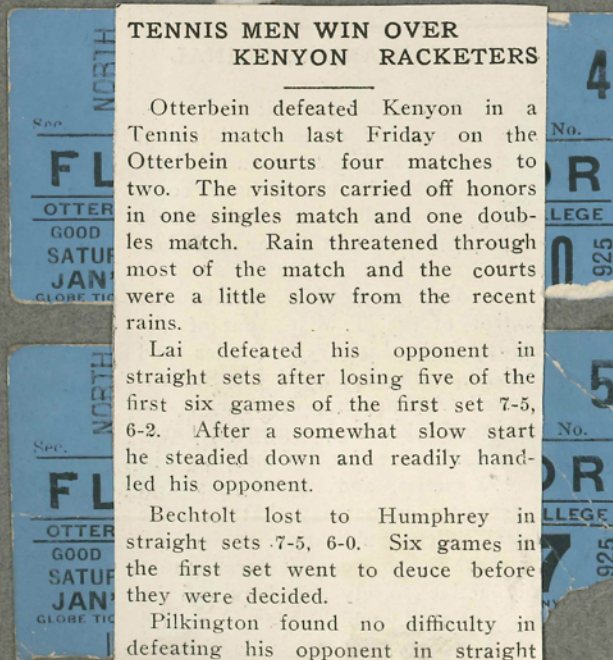
TENNIS MEN WIN OVER KENYON RACKETERS

Flyers Win Only One First and Tie One

STOUGHTON TAKES DASHES

Dayton's Hawaiian Athletes Make 21
of Flyer's 37 Points. Was
Eighth Win.

Otterbein defeated Dayton in a dual track meet last Saturday afternoon at Dayton 94 to 37. Otterbein took all but two of the first places unconditionally, and tied for one of the other places. This meet marked the eighth consecutive win for the varsity, the last dual meet having been lost to Denison in 1924.

Captain Stoughton did his usual weekly bit by winning the 100, 220 and 440 yard dashes. In addition he ran the last leg of the relay.

Dayton's strength was in the dashes and in one or two of the field events. They were weak in the distance runs. Cheek was leading one Dayton man by a lap and a half, and only lacked a little of being a lap ahead of the other.

Dayton's only firsts were in the low hurdles and the pole vault, the last named being a tie. Hipa nosed out Widdoes in the low hurdles in a race so close that it was almost impossible to judge after Widdoes had overcome the other Dayton man's four yard lead. Hipa received a tie for first in the pole vault when Widdoes brushed the cross bar with his arm in his third attempt at eleven feet and nine inches.

LAST MEET FOR 5 MEN

Stoughton Again Breaks 220-Yard
Record. Widdoes Ties Low
Hurdles Record.

Otterbein completed her successful season without the loss of a dual meet when the Tan and Cardinal tracksters defeated the Muskingum cinder artists last Saturday afternoon at New Concord, 82 to 49. It was the last dual meet of the season and was the ninth consecutive win for the Otterbein track team.

Stoughton was the high scorer of the meet with first places in his three favorites, the 100, the 220, and the 440 yard dashes besides running last on the winning relay team. Captain Stoughton, in his three years of inter-collegiate track meets, has not lost a race in a dual meet.

Stoughton again broke the 220 record when he ran the distance in 22.2 seconds. Widdoes equaled the 220 low hurdles record when he traveled the distance in 27.1 seconds. The co-holder of the record is W. H. Anderson, '24.

Otterbein took first places in eleven of the fifteen events, six second places and nine thirds. Muskingum took first and second places in two events, the javelin and the mile run, while Otterbein finished one-two in the 440, the 220, the pole vault and the half mile. The feature race of the afternoon was that between Cheek and

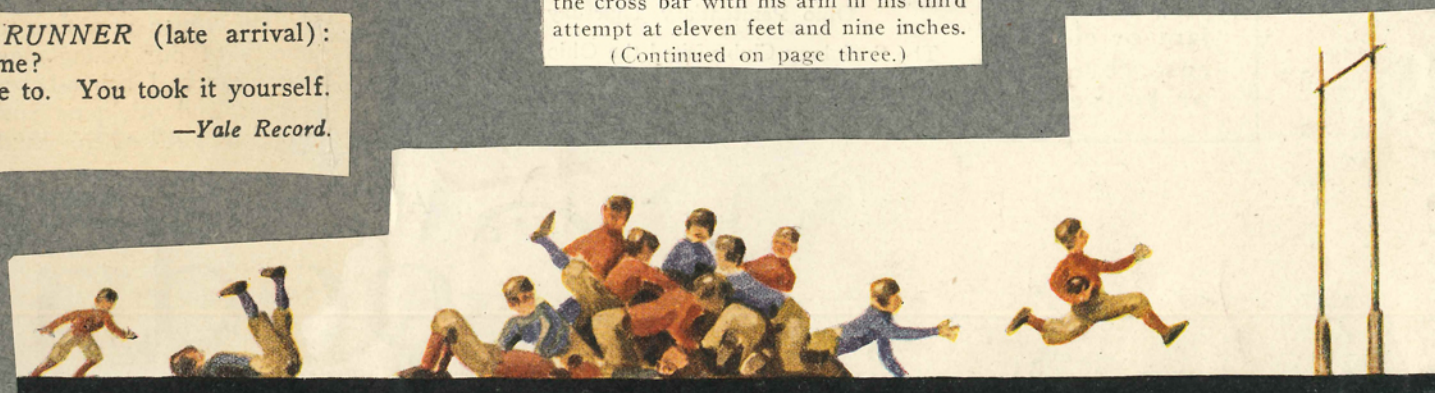

CAPTAIN STOUGHTON SHATTERS 440-YARD DASH RECORD AT BIG SIX MEET MAY 29

OTTERBEIN FINISHES SIXTH

**Pinney Breaks Tan High Jump Record
—Myers Places Second in
Pole Vault.**

Otterbein finished sixth in a meet of seventeen Ohio Conference colleges at the 24th annual Ohio Conference track meet with a total of 16½ points. Miami won the meet with 50 points. The schools finished as follows: Miami 50, Wesleyan 34½, Case 33, Oberlin 28, Cincinnati 23, Otterbein 16½, Denison 9, Akron 9, Ohio Northern 8, Wooster 7, Hiram 3, Ohio University 2, Wittenberg 2.

The meet was held at Oberlin for the first time in the history of the conference. The meet was the fastest of any so far and was well run off by the officials in charge.

Captain Stoughton completed three years of conscientious work on the track by winning the 440-yard dash in the record time of 49.4 seconds. In the preliminaries on Friday he set an Otterbein record in the 220-yard dash when he won the second heat in the fast time of 21.5 seconds. The finals in the 220 were not more than twenty minutes after the finish of the 440. In addition to the above named records "Doc" has a tie for the Otterbein record in the 100-yard dash at 10 seconds flat.

The Cleveland Plain Dealer has this to say about the quarter, "The Oberlin flash and conceded favorite, Dutch Harrar, took a surprising trimming in the 440 from Captain Stoughton, Otterbein's grand little runner. Observers who saw Stoughton lead Harrar in the preliminaries yesterday (Friday, May 28) thought it might be a flash. Today Stoughton ran Harrar out on the home stretch to set an Ohio 440 record at 49.4 seconds."

In addition to Captain Stoughton's two records one other was broken officially and two more unofficially. Captain-elect Pinney high jumped five feet eleven and a quarter inches to take second place in the event as well as to break the Otterbein record of 5 feet 9½ inches held by himself.

In the low hurdle preliminaries Coach Ditmer held a watch on Widdoes and caught him in at 26.5 seconds. The record will not stand however as only one watch was used. The present record of 27.1 seconds is held by Widdoes and Anderson, '24, jointly.

BOB SNAVELY BREAKS O. C. HIGH JUMP RECORD

KENYON WINS NO FIRSTS

**High Jump Record is 5 feet 9 1-4
Inches. Stoughton Is In-
dividual Star.**

Otterbein swamped Kenyon in a dual track meet on the Otterbein field last Saturday 103 to 26. The Tan and Cardinal cinder artists took every first place and all but six of the seconds.

Captain Stoughton was the individual star of the meet with a first place in each of the dashes, besides running anchor man on the relay team. Widdoes scored 13 points with a first in each of the hurdles and a second place in the pole vault.

Snavely broke the Otterbein high jump record with a leap of 5 feet, 9 1-4 inches. The old record of 5 feet, 8 1-4 inches was held by Campbell, of the class of 1915.

Stoughton equalled the Otterbein 440 record held by himself when he finished the race in the fast time of 51 seconds.

Several other Otterbein records were almost equalled and may be broken before the end of the season.

Meyer showed promise of being a good vaulter when he crossed the bar at the height of 11 feet, 6 inches.

Eberth scored most for Kenyon with a second in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, and when he was awarded second place in the 440 yard dash. The second Otterbein man was disqualified for cutting too close on the turn.

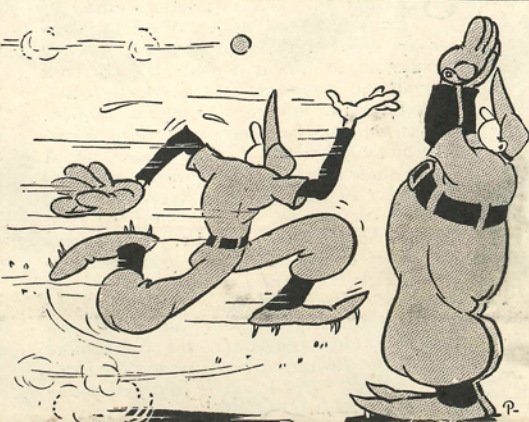

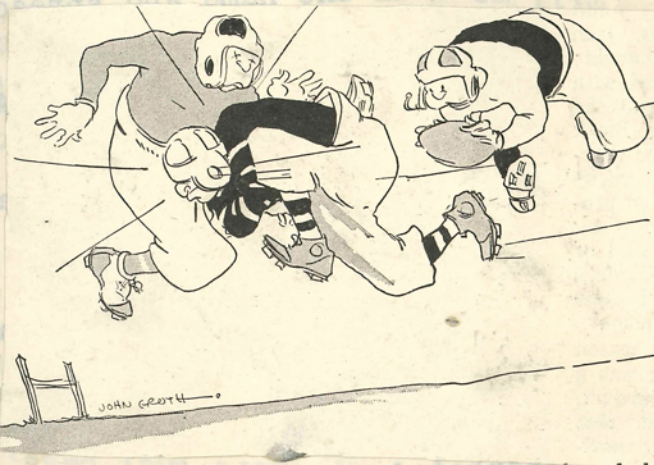

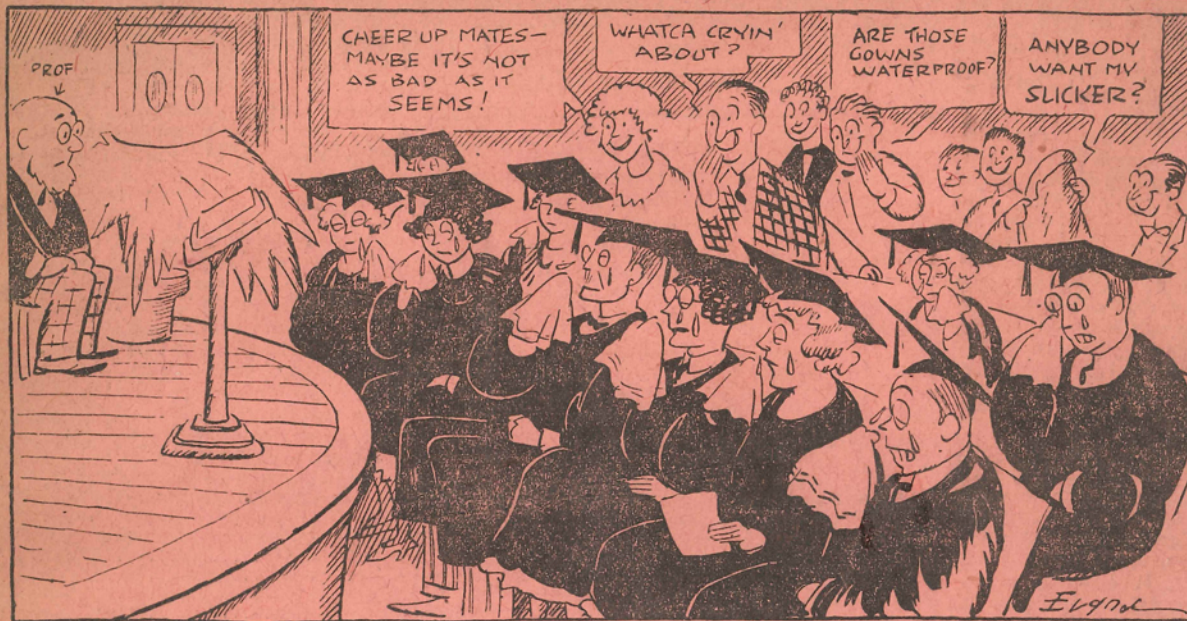

The ceremony includes the wearing of the cap and gown for the first time, marching across the campus to the chapel in a body, and entering the chapel after the entire student body and the faculty have gathered. A special section is reserved for the upperclassmen, and they ordinarily take their seats with the decorum that is expected of those about to be graduated from an institution of higher learning. Everything went accord-

ing to schedule Tuesday morning, until the seniors reached the door of the chapel. The juniors met them there, not with the accustomed awe, but with a shower of tear gas. It was a shock that completely demoralized the ranks and stripped the young men and women of every vestige of dignity. Feeling their way with stumbling steps, they gamely groped for their seats in the front rows, and although the chapel service was as cheerful as usual, every senior was forced to listen to the program with great tears rolling down his or her grownup cheeks.

The principal actors are members of his year's senior class and the scenery is cluttered up with straw hats, overalls, daffodils, dandelions, dolls and other articles too numerous to mention.

Enter the senior class into the chapel as the morning prelude peals from the organ. The boys are all dressed in straw hats and overalls while the girls wear gingham dresses, ribbons in their hair, carry dolls in their arms and are contentedly toying with lollypops. Although the organ plays a solemn strain, the students are all singing "Hail! Hail! The gang's all here," with both emphasis and volume.

TITTER.

The stage is now set, the actors are arraged before the audience and the play is started. Then one, J. Ruskin Hoover, a senior from Dayton, Ohio, advances and rising removes his straw hat. "Hear Ye," and a hush falls over the assemblage.

Stern professors stand aghast. The organist long since has subsided. But the students are merry and a titter runs through the sacred chamber.

Hoover has reached the platform and smilingly announces that, for no reason at all, the senior class has decided that Thursday will be a holiday. In a glowing account of the pleasures to be had afield, when books are forgotten and the cares that come to seniors in May are abandoned, Hoover dramatically dubs the entire class "Tramps" and proclaims the holiday for the senior class.

Then he concludes with this masterpiece:

With loud acclaim the class cheers his words. They are heartily in accord with these selfsame sentiments. Feeble protests of the few professors are unavailing. Spring is here and the senior class hears the call of the great outdoors in Westerville.

Someone starts to sing the "Old Gray Mare." The song is taken up, slowly at first, but gradually gaining

until the entire class is making the walls reverberate. One of the professors is seen to arise. Perhaps he believes it to be the Alma Mater anthem. At any rate he arises. The class gleefully swinging straw hats, lollypops and dolls, tumbles out of the chapel to gambol for a day in May.

The curtain lowers for a brief space while another scene is set. When it raises undergraduate students of Otterbein are revealed to the audience. They seem agitated. A strange unrest has crept over them. "If seniors have a holiday why not us?" Accordingly, just as the curtain is lowered the assemblage of juniors, sophomores and even freshmen are seen joining in the holiday.

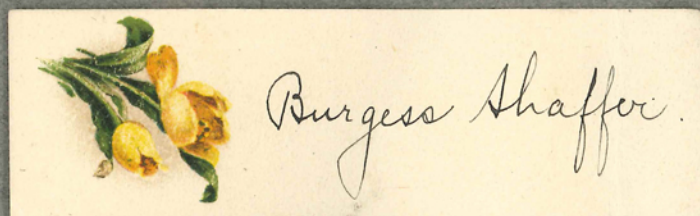

BEAVERDALE, April 21—Beaverdale is proud of the honors won recently by Miss Hazel Baker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Baker, of this place, who has been named valedictorian of the 1925 graduating class of Otterbein College, at Westerville, O. Miss Baker is said to be an exceptionally bright student. She was the valedictorian of the 1921 graduating class of the Beaverdale High School. She also won first prize in the Junior contest of her class in the Beaverdale High School. Miss Baker entered upon her High School course here at the age of 11 years.

Commencement at Otterbein College.

The seventy-eighth year of Otterbein College closed with a series of commencement events which perhaps eclipsed most others in the history of the college. The events began a week in advance, with open sessions of the four literary societies. These were all well attended and the programs of a high order.

Senior class day exercises, a new feature of the program revived from former years, was an interesting event. The attendance at the reception given by President and Mrs. Clippinger on Saturday evening was attended by the largest number of guests for a long period of years.

The baccalaureate service on Sunday morning was attended by an audience which crowded the large church. President W. G. Clippinger preached from the theme, "Exalting Christ." Rev. Earl C. Weaver, D.D., '10, Wilkesburg, Pennsylvania, delivered an able address to the joint anniversary of the Christian Associations in the evening.

From early morning to late at night Monday and Tuesday events, anniversaries, breakfasts, dinners, business meetings, and other features made up a busy round for faculty and guests. The board of trustees was in session during Monday afternoon and the entire day Tuesday. The chief feature of business character during the commencement week was the joint agreement between the alumni association and the board of trustees to employ a full-time alumni secretary. Provision for his appointment was made, but no candidate has yet been selected.

On Wednesday at 9:30, the largest audience for many years assembled at the commencement exercises. The address was delivered by the Reverend H. M. Lichliter, LL.D., on the theme, "The College Man and Public Opinion." The number of graduates was ninety-five, all but two of whom received bachelor's degrees, one diploma in Music and one in Art, were awarded. Honorary degrees were conferred as follows: Doctor of Divinity upon Rev. W. T. Frank, pastor of Oak Street United Brethren church, Dayton, Ohio; Rev. E. B. Learish, A.B., pastor of First United Brethren church, Scottdale, Pennsylvania; Rev. W. C. Poole, A.B., Ph.D., pastor of Christ church, London, England; Doctor of Laws upon the Reverend H. M. Lichliter, A. M., pastor of the First Congregational church, Columbus, Ohio; and Doctor of Letters upon Mr. Nolan Rice Best, A.B., New York City.

A larger number of guests from near and far attended this commencement than has been usual for several years. The business of the college closed in splendid shape, with a balance in the treasury in the current expense account. The college received for permanent funds and operating expense the sum of \$252,617.53. This amount was derived from old subscriptions, from Jubilee pledges, and from new gifts for endowment, equipment and current expense.

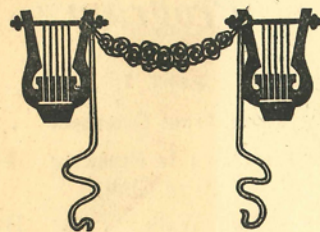

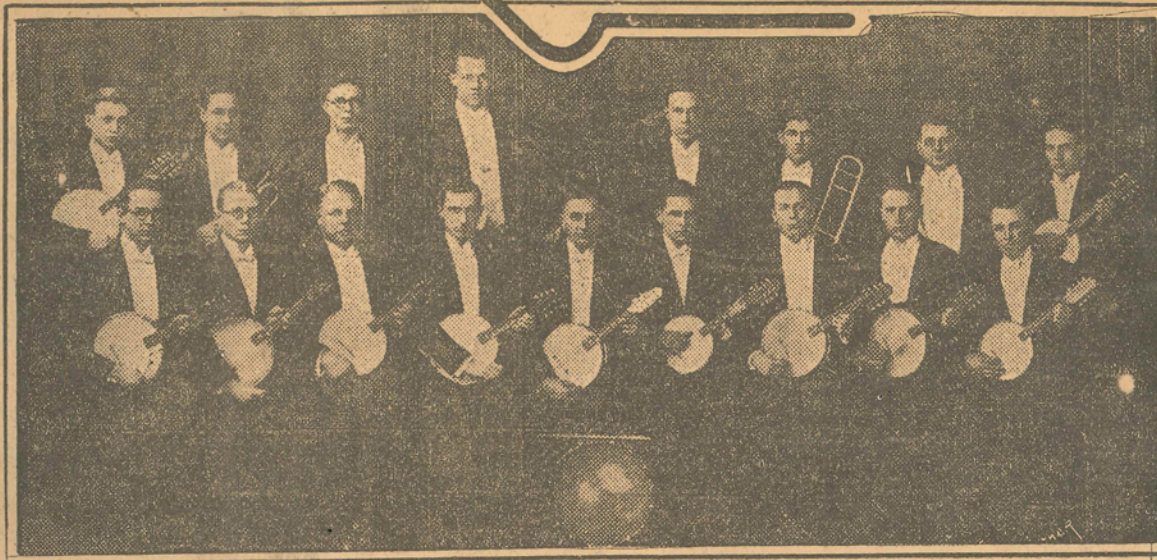

To Large Audiences.

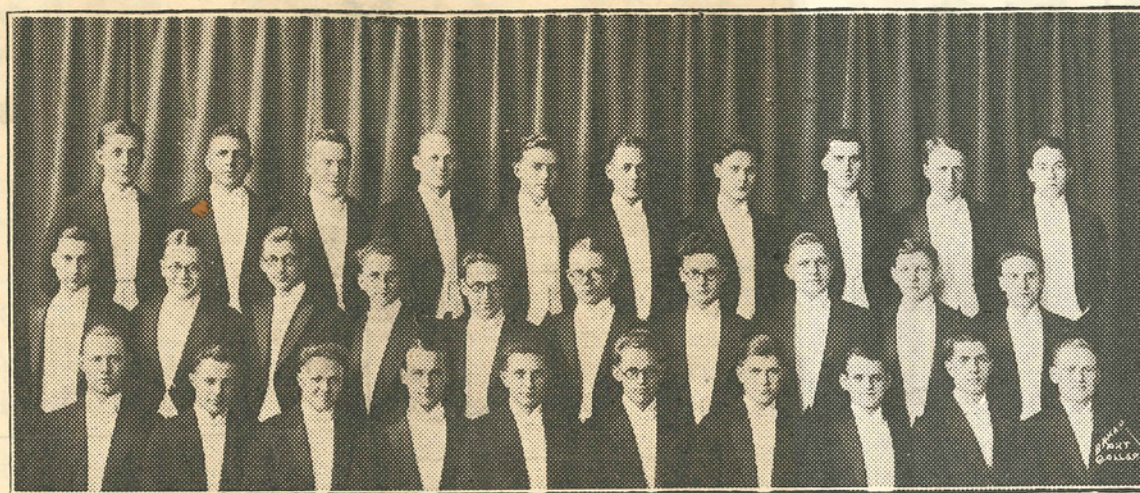
