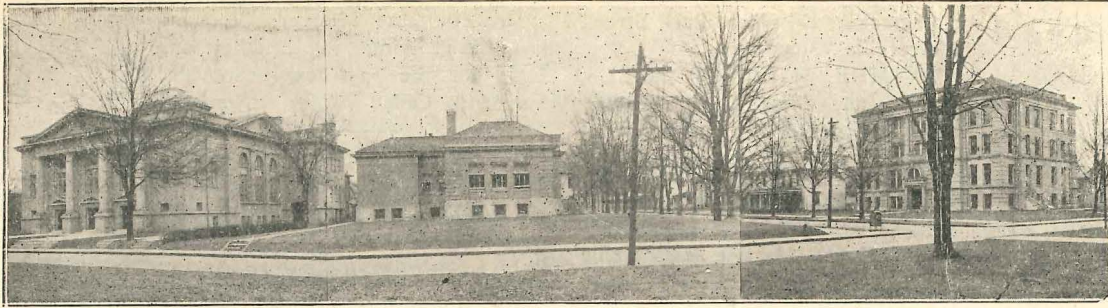

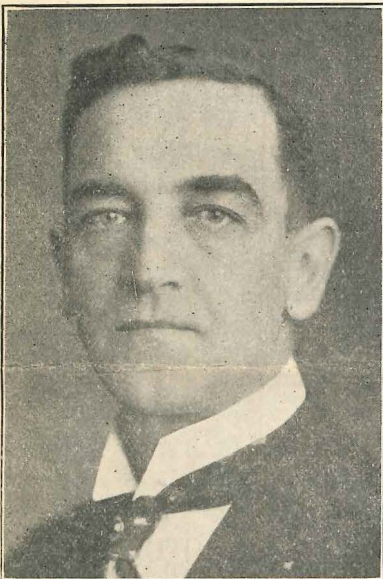

Seventy-Sixth Annual Commencement

Baccalaureate Speaker



Bishop Arthur R. Clippinger

Bishop Arthur R. Clippinger, who will preach the Baccalaureate sermon at 10:45 a. m., June 12, is a loyal friend of Otterbein and will be welcomed heartily by college people and the local church.

Bishop Clippinger was reared in Logan township, Franklin County, Pennsylvania, where he received his elementary education. He is a graduate of Lebanon Valley college and Yale Divinity school. His Alma Mater conferred upon him the D. D. degree.

In his early life he was a teacher in the public schools and later held pastorates in Pennsylvania, Connecticut and later served the Euclid Avenue church in Dayton. After serving three years as Conference Superintendent of Miami Conference he was called to the exalted position of Bishop of the Central Area which includes all of Ohio and the state of Tennessee.

He is affiliated in a leadership capacity with many church organizations including among them the chairmanship of the Committee on Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches in America. He is in great demand as a public speaker.

Interesting events beginning on Thursday, June 9, and extending over Monday, June 13, will call back the alumni and friends of Otterbein to assist the class of 1932, sixty-five in number, to help celebrate the graduating exercises.

The Ladies' Literary societies, the athletic organizations, the dramatic clubs and various other groups on the campus are planning gala events to enhance the pleasure of the occasion.

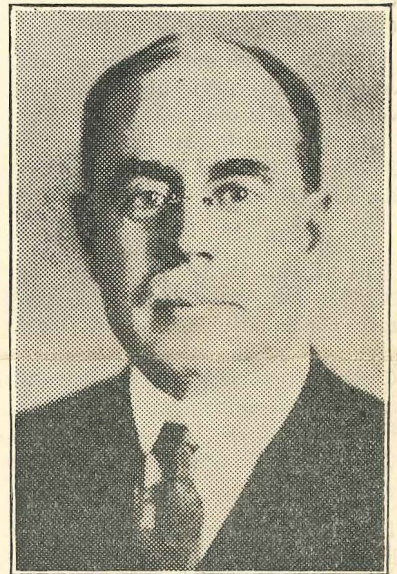

Thanks to the careful oversight of the administration Otterbein has suffered less than many others. Yet for the second time in many years the college faces a deficit of approximately \$10,000. This comes about because of failure in payment of gymnasium pledges and loss from investment securities. Curtailment of expenses has already begun and the faculty has volunteered to absorb about \$5,000 of this deficit in reduction of salaries.

In connection with the work of the Alumni Association, diminishing contributions has brought a deficit of about \$1,000 in this department. This handicaps the work that might be done by the Alumni working as a unit to uphold the standard and high position of our College.

She leaves besides her husband two children, Albert and Helen, both graduates of Otterbein.

Dr. David DeLong, who graduated from Otterbein in 1870 and later was prominent in educational circles passed away March 4, 1932 at his home in Los Angeles, California, at the mature age of eighty-six. For eleven years he was president of Lebanon Valley College.

Dr. George Gossard, president of Lebanon Valley College, died Sunday morning, April 17, in the John Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, Maryland. He had been in failing health for more than two years and had been a patient in the hospital since March 28.

Dr. Gossard had been president of Lebanon Valley for twenty years and that institution had grown remarkably under his efforts. His death is a severe loss to the college which he served and to the church and educational circles throughout the country.

Dr. William Beal Gantz of Pasadena, California, passed away on Sunday, March 13, 1932, after an illness of several years.

Dr. Gantz was born and reared in Westerville, Ohio, and graduated from Otterbein in 1895. He had served as pastor of several Presbyterian churches in Ohio and Michigan.

Honline, an ex-student of Otterbein, a former teacher in Bonebrake Seminary and well known in Religious Educational circles died on Monday, March 14, in the hospital at Pasadena, California, after an illness of only a few hours. Professor Honline was an Ohio boy coming to Otterbein from Highland County.
